YOUR REQUEST UNDER THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT

Thank you for your request received on 9th May 2009 in which you make the following request:

When the complaint by Mr Mark Robb was investigated it resulted in a document which I have a copy of (the NORTH YORKSHIRE POLICE, COMPLAINTS AND PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS DEPARTMENT COMPLAINT INVESTIGATION REPORT) what I am wishing to obtain is a list of the recipients of this report?

As you may be aware, although the Freedom of Information Act carries a presumption in favour of releasing information, it does contain exemptions which can be applied in certain circumstances either to allow public authorities to withhold information while confirming that they have it in their possession, or to allow them to refuse to confirm whether they hold the information at all.

Having considered your request under the Freedom of Information Act, I find that I am under no obligation to confirm or deny whether the IPCC holds the information you have requested. However, this should not be taken as conclusive evidence that the information you requested exists or does not exist. In reaching this decision I have taken into account the application of the exemption in section 40 (personal information) to the information described in the request.

Please be assured that we have carefully considered your request. However, if you are not satisfied with this response you may request an independent internal review by our FOI appeals officer, who has had no involvement in dealing with your request.
