Thank you for your e-mail of 19 August, to the Ministry of Defence Info Access Office requesting information about the award of the Ulster Defence Regiment (UDR) medal. Your request is being treated as a request for information in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

The UDR medal was introduced in 1982 and was awarded to part time members of the UDR with 12 years continuous service since 1 April 1970. A clasp is issued for a further 6 years service. It was superseded by the Northern Ireland Home Service Medal in 1992, but the historical issue of the UDR medal continues.

I will answer your questions in the order in which you have raised them-:

## How many UDR medals have been issued to date?

Prior to 1995 the total personnel who received the medal was 1,237. Some of these would also have received the clasp, however, it is not possible to identify these separately. Post 1995, when the records were computerised, a further 17 medals were issued, bringing the total number to 1,254. 57 clasps have also been issued during this period.

How many applications (either by the Regiment or personally by the soldier or officer) for the UDR medal have been refused?

This information is not held prior to 1995. Since then, however, there have been 35 applications for the UDR medal rejected and a further 3 applications for the clasp.

If you are unhappy with this response or you wish to complain about any aspect of the handling of your request, then you should contact me in the first instance. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not investigate your case until the MOD internal review process has been completed.
