Thank you for your request under the *Freedom of Information Act 2000* (the Act). This response is provided on behalf of NHS Camden Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG). Your request along with the CCG's response is detailed below.

1. What has been the average cost of placement and services provided in an assessment treatment unit within the last three years? Please break this information down into the average cost per year. (2016, 2017, 2018)

2016 - £125,956 per placement

2017 - £184,479 per placement

2018 - £140,002 per placement

2. How many people have been placed in assessment treatment units following a hospital order under the Mental Health Act 1983 in the last three years? Please break this information down into how many people are in an ATU per year over the last 3 years (2016, 2017, 2018)

2016 - 6

2017 - 5

2018 - *<5





3. How many patients with learning disabilities and autism have been detained under the Mental Health Act or are on a Deprivation of Liberty Safeguard under the Mental Capacity Act in the last three years? Please break these down into how many people have been detained per year. (2016, 2017, 2018).

2017 - 82

2018 - 55

4. How many patients with learning disabilities and autism are in hospitals voluntarily in the last three years? Please break this information down into how many people enter hospital voluntarily each year. (2016, 2017, 2018).

NHS Camden CCG does hold this information. The CCG considers that this information is exempt under *Freedom of Information Act 2000, Section 40(2) (personal information)* as disclosure of this level of detail could lead to the identification of individuals, which would be in breach of Data Protection legislation. Although I cannot confirm the exact figure, I can confirm that the number in each of these categories is less than five.

The Freedom of Information Act 2000 introduces a broader concept of risk of personal identifiable information because its test for deciding whether personal data can be disclosed is whether disclosure to a member of the public would breach the data protection principles. This means that public authorities have to assess whether releasing apparently anonymised data to a member of the public would breach the data protection principles.

This is intended to ensure that public authorities take into account the additional information that a member of the public might have (information on the Web or in news reports, public libraries, court records etc.) that could allow data to be combined to produce information that relates to and identifies a particular individual - and that is therefore personal data.





Low statistical values increase the likelihood of seemingly anonymised information being combined with other information to identify an individual.

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We will record your contact and request details in order to monitor and improve the service we provide and in order to discharge our statutory obligations under the Act. This information will be handled in accordance with the NHS Confidentiality Code of Practice and the *Data Protection Act 2018*.

Using personal data we provide

You are required not to use personal data which is provided to you for electronic marketing (telesales, fax, e-mail) to our staff and comply with the Privacy and Electronic Communications (EC Directive)

Regulations 2003. Provision of such personal data in response to a Freedom of Information or

Environmental Information request does not constitute consent from the individual concerned.

The *Data Protection Act* gives individuals rights to prevent processing likely to cause substantial unwarranted damage or unwarranted distress (section 10) and to prevent processing for the purposes of direct marketing (section 11). You should be aware that selling, giving or sharing of personal data could breach the *Data Protection Act*. NEL advises staff of their rights on behalf of Clinical Commissioning Groups.
