SMALL BUSINESS COMMISSIONER: DISCUSSION PAPER

The Government is concerned that not enough small businesses are able to settle their problems with larger corporations sufficiently quickly and inexpensively while maintaining their business relationships.

We know that some smaller firms suffer because of an imbalance in bargaining power when dealing with larger businesses. These issues can put them under additional pressure, limiting their opportunity for growth, and in some circumstances, putting their business at risk.

Creating a Small Business Conciliation Service was a manifesto commitment. We have decided to give this new service the working title of "Small Business Commissioner" to reflect its proposed remit which will include mediation and a complaints handling service as well as conciliation. The Government announced our intention to bring forward the necessary legislation this Parliamentary session in the Queen's Speech. This will be as part of the forthcoming Enterprise Bill, which we expect to introduce in the autumn, when Parliamentary time allows.

Establishing this new service will mean small businesses know where to turn when they are in dispute, or feel they are being treated unfairly. We propose the service has a remit to cover disputes about payment and other contractual supply chain disputes.

We are now in a position to publish a discussion paper on this. This paper sets out the government's current understanding of the problems that small businesses face and our thinking about possible solutions.

Discussion Document

The discussion paper seeks further evidence of the issues and sets out proposals for addressing these via a Small Business Commissioner. We propose that the Commissioner should have the remit to cover disputes over late payment and other supply chain contractual

We propose the service is set up with three key functions:

- Providing Information, general advice and signposting
- · Resolving disputes through mediation
- Dealing with complaints

It will be set up to complement other existing resolution services. In doing so it will build on the current package of measures – forthcoming transparency reforms and the strengthened Prompt Payment Code - to drive a long lasting and wide reaching change in UK payment culture and behaviour. The discussion paper proposes some solutions, and seeks answers to some questions on the issues small businesses are experiencing and the likely impact of the proposals. The paper encourages a frank and open discussion on the issues.

The discussion paper has been published today on gov.uk and will close on Friday 21st August 2015. We recognise that the matters discussed in this paper could potentially impact on both reserved and devolved areas of policy responsibility across the UK's family of nations. The Government is keen to engage and work closely with the Devolved Administrations on this, and depending on the agreed way forward, to determine if our planned legislation will require a Legislative Consent Motion.

I would be grateful if our officials could work closely together in the coming weeks and months to ensure that this policy can work fully in a devolved context. BACKGROUND

- 1. UK Government has made a commitment to address concerns around small businesses' ability to resolve issues with large corporations. The Department for Business, Innovation and Skills ("BIS") has suggested that some smaller firms suffer because of an imbalance in bargaining power when dealing with larger businesses. These issues can put them under additional pressure, limiting their opportunity for growth, and in some circumstances, putting their business at risk.

- 6. BIS has designed the proposed SBCS to complement other existing resolution services. In doing so it will build on the current package of measures – forthcoming transparency reforms and the strengthened Prompt Payment Code - to drive a long lasting and wide reaching change in UK payment culture and behaviour. The discussion paper proposes some solutions, and seeks answers to some questions on the issues small businesses are experiencing and the likely impact of the proposals.

NEXT STEPS

7. BIS officials have been in contact with DETI officials to explore the impact of the proposals on Northern Ireland. This will be in the context of the planned Enterprise Bill, scheduled for late 2015. DETI officials are continuing to work closely with their BIS counterparts to ensure that any necessary steps for the NI devolved administration are identified at an early stage, and actioned as appropriate.

RECOMMENDATION

8. That you note the attached letter and discussion paper and agree to DETI officials continuing to work with BIS to identify the most appropriate next steps.
