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# **Connie Bristow**

# - The Consummate Professional



Staff in Consultation and Inclusion Support Services (CISS) and Walsall schools were deeply saddened to learn of the death, after serious illness, of Connie Bristow on 31 October 2008.

Connie came to Walsall from Solihull in January 2004. She joined CISS in the post of Senior Practitioner, Curriculum Development and Differentiation and quickly established herself as a senior member of staff who was a source of great knowledge and expertise in the field of special educational needs. She led on many borough-wide initiatives, including the development of Wave 3 literacy materials and the implementation of P Levels. Her love of language and literacy was evident, as was her attention to detail. There was no better proof-reader than Connie. Anyone who has ever spent time with her will have heard her lament at what she called 'the abuse of the apostrophe'! She possessed a wry wit and a dry sense of humour, and team meetings are not the same without her.

Elaine Smitheman, SENCO at Hillary Street Primary, remembers Connie as "...an inspiration, never wanting a fuss made even when she felt poorly. She kept us on our toes, having high expectations, but at the same time reassuring us and setting a good example for us to follow, always being at the end of a telephone to advise and support.

that compare to Connie's! Over the too few years that Connie was our Advisory Teacher she became our friend. The TAs enjoyed the training she provided and the cakes she brought with her! They looked forward to the time they spent working with her. During the time I worked with Connie I felt privileged to call her a friend and will miss her very much. My final memory of the last time I saw Connie was as we joked about the heaviness of our school gates which I was struggling with - the beam on her face and then mouthed 'see you soon' as I let her out...sadly I didn't."

None of us can take IPM minutes

Connie is sadly missed by all her colleagues and friends. Jeannette Barnfield, Deputy headteacher and SENCO at Whitehall Junior, remembers Connie as someone who would "...do the business in school time as well as before and after, taking the minutes at IPMs, talking to staff, working with pupils and meeting with parents. She would also go the 'extra mile' chatting on a personal level. She was really intuitive and could tell at a glance if someone was having a 'bad day'. We spent endless hours after school engaged in conversation. She'd often say, 'I'm not keeping you, am I?' when often it was I who was keeping her after a long, hard day.

I invited her into my classroom

to witness our renditions of "Jaberwocky" and "The Pied Piper" and she was impressed that the children had actually learned the poems. The children grew with pride as she applauded their efforts and their performance.

And that's the effect that the diminutive size 10 had on all those with whom she came into contact, pupils and adults alike. She was a real 'powerhouse' instilling confidence in others letting them grow and indeed blossom. After a consultation, one of our parents appeared upset. When I enquired why she was crying, she said she wasn't upset; she was happy because someone had actually listened to her. Connie was a great listener. Though she knew she was unwell, she had planned to deliver a staff meeting with me, Connie preparing most of the presentation. Despite my protests, the consummate professional drafted out and emailed the presentation, even commenting on how she was looking forward to our joint training. Sadly she became too unwell to be at the meeting but her presence was felt throughout the Inset session. I shall miss Connie and her warmth and generosity, her kindness, her understanding and her wry sense of humour. God Bless, Connie."

We will all miss her.

## Parent Support Advisers Caught on Camera!

Parent Support Advisers were caught on camera recently as film-makers recorded the successes of the PSA project in schools across the borough during the pilot phase.

Schools have now received and enjoyed their copy of 'PSA – One Year in Walsall' and indeed, many have commented that the DVD format has proved ideal in 'grabbing the attention' of schools in the expansion phase and other interested parties who might not otherwise have had the opportunity to read the lengthy and detailed evidence provided. It has hopefully encouraged and stimulated further participation in parent support methodology.

The evaluation highlights the positive indicators revealed during the pilot phase, and indicates that these are being sustained and developed. There is now increasing evidence being reported of the effectiveness of the parent support role, both by parents and by PSAs themselves. At the same time, the development of the

role is bringing its own challenges including increased demands on PSAs as they become better known.

The DVD 'PSA - One Year in Walsall' celebrates the diverse ways in which PSAs have been used to support parents in need - and even crisis - as well as the many varied parent programmes that are being delivered, complementing delivery during the statutory school day. As headteacher Keith Whittlestone points out to schools that are considering employing a PSA, "I would say go for it because the positive outcomes and the impact that we have seen in the short time we have had a PSA is absolute and significant."

Parent Support Advisers themselves also seem to like the methodology in having a 'foot in both camps.' Dawn Williams at Rough Hay School said, "I really enjoy being a Parent Support Adviser. I'm somebody in school who is not a teacher but who is still accessible to parents. They

can come to me when they need someone to speak to in confidence. Whatever problem they bring to me, we can see it through to the end."

A number of schools have been able to maintain PSA employment through changing the PSA terms and conditions to include other roles such as office work, learning mentor, teaching assistant, attendance officer, family support worker or nursery teacher; and some Extended School Clusters have allocated additional elements of their Extended Service Grant to bolster the funding available for PSA

Many schools are now well underway with regard to PSA recruitment and we will shortly be announcing appropriate training programmes scheduled for January 2009.

Both PSA Coordinators remain available on behalf of Walsall Children's Services, in a consultancy capacity through Learning Beyond Limited, to support those PSAs and schools who request further information, advice and guidance throughout the expansion phase.

PSA Coordinator Teresa
Powney said, "PSA – One Year in
Walsall' was great fun to make
and now schools say they are
considering using a similar format
to record and celebrate many

# Aim Higher for Looked After Children in Walsall

Pupils from the four Black Country authorities – Walsall, Dudley, Sandwell and Wolverhampton were invited to a 'Reaching Higher' event (Day I Wolverhampton University 17 October and Day 2 Beaudesert Camp 13 November)

# **Pay 1** Wolverhampton University 17 October

The aims of the day:

- students become familiar with university life
- students meet other students in other Black Country authorities
- opportunities to meet university students and explore facilities on offer
- aspirations are raised

Of the 60 students attending the event Walsall had 24 students from eight different secondary schools, which was by far the best representation. Staff from the Virtual School and Connexions staff also accompanied the students on the day and took an active part in the activities.

Teams were created using students from all areas, student ambassadors and guests. This gave a competitive edge to the ice breaking activities which were enjoyed by all.

Each group was then taken on an informal tour of the facilities by our student ambassador where we saw the library, computer block, counselling and student help area, sporting and recreational block and importantly the refectory.

The investigative task gave groups the opportunity to explore the Wolverhampton University site, finding opportunities to talk to students and consider the pros and cons of university life in 2008.

Posters and newsletters were produced to a very high standard and reflected upon in a plenary session.

All of our students, both looked after children and other Aim Higher students, as well as having their

aspirations raised towards higher education also improved:

- · communication skills
- listening skills
- working in a team
- working out of their comfort zone
- · investigative skills

#### **Pay 2** Beaudesert Camp 13 November

The second day in this Reaching Higher project took place at Beaudesert Camp near Cannock where the focus was on outdoor team building activities. All students said they were looking forward to this but would our staff be as keen to take part?

The aims of the day:

- students challenge themselves and face unfamiliar surroundings and tasks
- students meet and face challenges with other students in other Black Country authorities
- opportunities to meet forces staff and explore career opportunities
- to push personal limits, face fears and develop team building skills
- to develop confidence and demonstrate courage

The weather consistently proved to be typically English and waterproof clothing was certainly the order of the day!

As for Day I we had by far the best representation of all the authorities. Of the 50 Black Country students attending I6 of these came from Walsall. The numbers were slightly down compared to the October event due to a GCSE Modular Maths exam taking place

in schools. It was really pleasing to note that six students were brought to the venue during the day by carers or teaching staff after sitting their examination. With the weather conditions this showed real dedication!

Teams were created using students from all four local authority areas, with guests also being allocated. This gave a team focus to all the planned activities which included:

- abseiling
- crate stacking
- jacobs ladder
- army course
- tree climbingclimbing wall
- low ropes
- ariel runway

During the course of the day barriers were broken, friendships formed, fears conquered, difficult tasks were completed and a team ethos created. The weather may have dampened the clothes but not the spirits of the young people who took part in all activities with a cheerful outlook.

With this new found confidence and the opportunity of accessible Higher Education shown to them the next phase will be individual focus of our looked after children targeting courses of interest to them.

# Transforming Learning - Building Schools for the Future and Primary Capital Programme

Children, parents, and teachers in Walsall are being urged to have a say on how a £200 million pound cash investment could transform learning across the borough.

A major consultation programme will get underway in the new year to gather everyone's views on a new twin track initiative that will shape school environments and the way they operate for generations to come.

The transforming learning programme, which incorporates the Primary Capital Programme and Building Schools for the Future initiatives, will boost all Walsall schools, children, young people and their families.

Walsall successfully bid to join the government's national BSF programme in the summer and work is now underway preparing detailed plans to maximise the potential impact of up to £100 million investment in the borough's secondary schools.

Last month Walsall secured a similar amount of £100 million funding from the Primary Capital Programme to revolutionise teaching and learning in primary schools over the next decade.

Together the combined investment offers a once in a lifetime opportunity to transform learning, creating 21st Century learning environments that engage and inspire young people, their teachers and the wider community.

Walsall Council and Serco are working together to produce a Strategy for Change document that sets out Walsall's vision for the future. It is this that will form the basis of the initial consultation and engagement.

Walsall's Children's Trust will oversee consultation with pupils to ensure that the views of children and young people are heard and help shape developments.

Headteachers from both primary and secondary schools will be involved throughout the process, with representatives on the transforming learning programme board. A headteacher will also be seconded to the programme team.

School governors will also be asked to contribute to Walsall's vision and others from business, trade

unions and the wider community will also be able to feed in their views via a stakeholder group.

Walsall Council is also planning a series of consultation events across the borough later in the spring to engage with parents, residents and community groups.

One of the cornerstones of Walsall's transforming learning programme is to ensure schools become learning hubs for local communities, offering learning opportunities for people of all ages, from the cradle to the grave.

It is also possible that other services, such as health, library, sports and leisure facilities could be co-located in the new schools.

Walsall's intention is to maximise the investment in schools by linking in to current and ongoing regeneration initiatives, such as the development of the Gigaport.

Initially five projects will be directly affected in the first stage with either new or refurbished buildings, but **all Walsall secondary schools** will ultimately benefit from future phases of the BSF programme.

As well as contributing to the overall borough vision, every school will be asked to produce their own Strategy for Change which will set out in detail specific plans that will take into account specific aims and objectives based on local conditions.

# Children's Area Partnership - Integrated service delivery at the local level

The Children's Area Partnership (CAP) development is Walsall's response to the requirements of the Children Act 2004 to ensure the delivery of integrated local services is met.

Children Area Partnerships will play a vital role in bringing together the key providers of services for children and young people in local areas and will have a critical role in shaping the delivery of universal and targeted services for children and young people within their area.

The 15 Children's Area Partnerships have been launched in three phases. The areas have been identified in order that a variety of geographical areas and demographics are covered. Most have had strong school cluster collaboration and/or designated cluster coordination arrangements and it is the intention that the Childrens Area Partnerships will support and build on the collaborative work in these areas.

All Phase I Children's Area Partnerships have actions which they are working on.

## Pelsall, Rushall & Shelfield Children's Area Partnership

In the initial stages, Jane Clark, Head of Pelsall Village Primary, took on the responsibility of Chair. The CAP agreed outline priorities and, with the support of the Local Neighbourhood Partnership, organised an initiative called Be Safe, Play Safe for all the schools in the cluster based at Pelsall Village School. Agencies such as the police and fire service were invited to provide child friendly information and advice on safety issues. Other organisations provided information on activities that were available to children and young people.

Through Extended Schools Services, Healthy Road Shows were also organised at two schools to coincide with parents meeting the children after school. Multisport activities and free swimming for children and families were provided at several sites in the communities during the summer holidays. These activities complemented the play schemes and other activities offered by schools in the cluster. The impact of these activities combined with other initiatives was measured against anecdotal evidence and data provided by the police. They appeared to have a positive impact on antisocial behaviour in the area.

In September Extended Schools was subsumed into the cluster's Children's Area Partnership and the Extended Schools Consultant took responsibility for chairing the CAP.

Subsequently the CAP priorities have been confirmed as:

- involving young people
- · raising aspirations

The process to identify working groups which will plan projects to deliver these priorities is now in progress.

In the interim we have initiated two projects relating to the priorities.

#### **Raising Aspirations**

Research correlates positive levels of aspiration with high levels of self confidence and self esteem. Schools who wish to take part will identify children who they consider lacking self confidence or having low self esteem. The programme is planned to promote self esteem and self confidence through social and physical

activities. Children will be invited to join a programme of indoor and outdoor activities culminating in a residential at the Local Authority's Residential Outdoor Centre. Working with an educational psychologist we are identifying a tool for self assessment of self esteem that will be used to measure any changes. By raising self confidence and self esteem we aim to raise self-confidence that will be reflective in levels of achievement

#### **Involving Young People**

School councils were asked to debate two topics (the local environment and safety). Two representatives along with staff from each school met for a morning at the Aldridge Airport Outdoor Centre in order to formulate a collective view to take to the CAP. Following the meeting young people took part in climbing and ropes course activities organised by the centre. In addition to being a reward for their contribution the activities also proved to be a very effective ice breaker. The young people are keen to make these meetings regular events.

# Embedding Every Child Matters in Walsall

For over two years Walsall Children's Services - Serco has organised a SEN Involvement Programme for schools in the borough. The programme had three

- I. To further embed SEN and inclusion in Walsall
- 2. To take the SEN policy and Delivery Plan forward in a way which continues to involve stakeholders in shaping the future
- 3. To consolidate SEN policy, provision and support in Walsall as amongst the best in the country

The programme's modules were of interest to headteachers, SENCOs/ Inclusion Coordinators. SEN Governors and colleagues from Walsall Children's Services -Serco with a concern for further embedding SEN and Inclusion in Walsall. In the summer term 2007 the module had a simple title of 'Every Child Matters?' Our objectives were:

- to agree a shared understanding of children and young people with SEN and disabilities being an integral part of ECM
- · to identify key signposts in ECM and their links to SEN
- to develop a framework of action
- to explore meaningful multiagency working

module were:

- a working document which demonstrates a clear understanding of the signposts
- a clear understanding of how SEN events and activities contribute to the ECM agenda
- a shared understanding of key features of multi-agency working

The key outcome was a working document. This finished document includes links with other plans and developments both nationally and locally and web links where possible.

In an attempt to be as userfriendly as possible a glossary was included for those colleagues who might be new to SEN and disability. Each of the five Every Child Matters outcomes included a national overview with pertinent The outcomes identified for the considerations reprinted from SENCO Update<sup>1</sup>. The DCSF has produced the Special Educational Needs/Learning Difficulties and Disabilities Self-Evaluation Framework to support local authorities (LAs) in reviewing and evaluating strategy, services and provision for children and young people with SEN and LDD. The outcomes were then looked at in terms of the local perspective. Colleagues had shared in the SEN Involvement Programme what kind of activities they were using to achieve

the outcomes and what evidence

they were capturing. The final aspect was the multi-agency links that colleagues had found useful. The document is presented in tabular format and covers the following five

- I. targets and indicators
- 2. outcomes
- 3. how to achieve outcomes
- 4. evidence
- 5. multi-agency links

The pages for 'Achieve Economic Wellbeing' show the current stage of development of the document.

#### **Community Cohesion in Action -**

### School Linking

On I September 2007 the new duty to promote Community Cohesion came into effect for schools and from I September 2008, HMCI has a duty under section 5 of the Education Act 2005 (as inserted by section 154 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006) to report on the contribution made by schools to community cohesion.

Inspectors will be looking to see what contribution schools – those with a diverse population and those which are less diverse or monocultural - are making to community cohesion. Where a school is predominantly monocultural the guidance to inspectors states, "...where the pupil population is less diverse or predominantly of one socioeconomic, ethnic, religious or non-religious background, more will need to be

done to provide opportunities for interaction between

children and young people from different backgrounds."

School linking projects which allow interaction between children from different backgrounds are not new to Walsall. However the following project is slightly different because the aim is for pupils to meet up regularly over the next two years and not just a one off event.

The headteachers from Croft Community Primary School and Watling Street Primary School began planning their community cohesion linking project in the summer term. In September this year they organised the initial 'getting to know each other'

Approximately 25 Yr 5 pupils from each school spent a day at Upton Warren – an outdoor education centre in Worcestershire. Activities available included a range of team building exercises and traditional water sports. Pupils were put into groups of eight, four pupils from each school, two boys and two girls.

It took a while for the groups to bond but the activities helped this to happen.

By the end of the day the pupils had gelled, they were talking freely to each other and looking forward to their next event and seeing each other again. It was heartening to see pupils moving outside of their familiar social settings and developing new friendships through team building activities and the sports activities which were led by Rod Dixon, headteacher of Croft Community Primary School. The headteachers have planned for pupils from both schools to visit each other's schools in the near future.

One highlight of the day was when Les Powell, headteacher of Watling Street Primary rescued some of the pupils who had built a raft. When it began to sink she selflessly waded and swam through the cold water to bring the pupils and raft to the safety of the

# **Farmington Fellowships**

#### The Farmington Institute

The aim of the Farmington Institute is to support and encourage teachers of Religious Education in schools, and Headteachers working on values and standards. It is financed by the Farmington Trust.

The Institute awards Fellowships to teachers of Religious Education in schools and Headteachers, publishes discussion papers and arranges conferences.
