Fly-tipping in rural areas: Debate Briefing Pack

Context

Title of the debate: Fly-tipping in rural areas.

MP who secured the debate: Anne Marie Morris MP.

How the debate came about: End of Day adjournment debate.

Key Messages

Key facts and figures

- For the 2016/17 year, local authorities in England dealt with over 1 million (1,002,000) fly-tipping incidents, a 7% increase from 2015/16.
- Two thirds (67%) of fly-tips involved household waste which saw an increase of 8% from 2015/16. The most common place for fly-tipping to occur was on highways, which accounted for 49% of total incidents in 2016/17.
- The estimated cost of clearance for fly-tipping to local authorities in England in 2016/17 was around £58 million.
- Local authorities carried out 474,000 enforcement actions in 2016/17 at an estimated cost of around £16 million, a decrease of 20,000 actions and £880,000 in cost from 2015/16.
- The number of fixed penalty notices issued increased by 56% to 56,000 in 2016/17.
- In 2016/17 the Environment Agency dealt with 218 incidents of large-scale illegal dumping of waste in England.

These data do not necessarily mean, that fly-tipping is increasing and could represent a higher level of reporting through use of new technology and extended staff training. Factors such as population density, housing stock and commuter routes all have an impact on fly-tipping rates, as does the rate of reporting, so for these reasons like for like comparisons between local authorities should not be made

Fly-tipping

Fly-tipping is unacceptable wherever it occurs. Local authorities or the Environment Agency are not under any legal obligation to clear fly-tipped waste from private property because the responsibility falls to the landowner.

We expect all local authorities to investigate fly-tipping incidents on farmland - prosecuting the fly-tippers and recovering clearance costs where possible. Local Authorities also provide advice and guidance on measures that can be taken to prevent further fly-tipping.

What are the penalties for fly-tipping?

The penalties for fly-tipping are:

- On summary conviction: imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months or a fine of up to £50,000 or both; and
- On conviction on indictment: imprisonment for a term not exceeding 5 years or a
 potentially unlimited fine or both.

Companies and their directors, officers and senior employees can be imprisoned. There is also the possibility of convicted persons being refused authorisation to operate as a waste carrier or run a waste management site as well as such authorisation being revoked.

The fine for a Fixed Penalty Notice is not less than £150 and not more than £400 as specified by the waste collection authority, and £200 if no amount is specified.

The Sentencing Guideline for environmental offences was reviewed and strengthened in 2014. The maximum penalty on indictment for fly-tipping is imprisonment of up to five years or a potentially unlimited fine. The Government will continue to provide information to the Sentencing Council as they monitor the impact of the guidance.

What are you doing about large scale fly-tipping incidents?

In 2016/17 the Environment Agency dealt with 218 incidents of large-scale illegal dumping of waste in England. More serious incidents or commercial fly-tipping should continue to be enforced by the local authorities and the Environment Agency under existing prosecution powers through the magistrates' courts.

Whilst local authorities deal with the majority of fly-tipping, the Environment Agency investigates major fly-tipping incidents if they occur on public or private land. These include:

BIG: Large illegal waste sites (greater than 20 tonnes)

BAD: Evidence of organised tipping or criminal business practice

NASTY: Hazardous waste (over 75 litres)
