# **Nuno Honoured by University**

The University was delighted to award Wolves manager Nuno Espirito Santo an Honorary Doctor of Sport at the club's last home match of the season.

It is thought to be the first time a football manager has received a university honorary doctorate on the pitch at a match.

The honour recognises Nuno's success over the last two seasons which have seen Wolverhampton gain recognition and attention internationally, returning a sense of pride back to the city and club.



#### Research

The University is to lead on a prestigious €3 million arts sector grant, the first of its kind at Wolverhampton and a first within the Europe Innovative Training Network.

The Future of European Independent Art Spaces in a Period of Socially Engaged Art (FEINART) will pioneer a new approach to art education. The project is an extensive collaboration between degree-awarding research centres in political philosophy, art theory/practice and curatorial studies cultural management and the independent European art sector. The Faculty of Arts received funding for the project from the Horizon 2020 Marie Curie Innovative Training Networks strand. The University will train 11 Early-Stage Researchers in order to provide the relevant skills to engage with the challenges of this new artistic and cultural landscape.

Research Week takes place during June. The week will start with the University's Annual Research Conference on Monday June 17 and Tuesday June 18. The remainder of the week will focus on careers, engaging in funded research projects and the completion of doctoral studies.

A new Centre for Psychological Research has been launched. The centre will focus on both applied and theoretical areas of psychology and it will be split into four research clusters; Cognition and Individual Differences, Cyberpsychology, Social and Community Psychology and Wellbeing and Psychological Health. The launch event showcased research from the centre and also featured Professor Maria Uther's inaugural lecture on the topic of 'Sound, Speech and their interaction with technology'.



# Sustainability

Following my staff roadshow events in January, which sought to help establish the University's position on sustainable development, we are now looking for an enthusiastic and proactive individual to help devise and

drive the University's approach to sustainability and meet its ambition to be a sector leading institution.

With a focus on its campuses, curriculum and community, the main purpose of the role will be to develop a coherent and holistic sustainable development framework, strategy and plan for the University in conjunction with a senior level Steering Group and through extensive consultation.

## **Estates Update**


You may have noticed the new artwork that has gone up recently on the exterior of the Rosalind Franklin Building at City Campus. The work, created by Jason Bruges Studio, represents the double helix structure of DNA as seen by Rosalind Franklin during her scientific work.

The artwork was installed as part of an agreement with the council at the planning stages which sees a contribution to public art.

Work is now due to start on the new cyber centre at Hereford with a ground breaking taking place at the beginning of June. The centre at Skylon Park will bring up to 190

high-value jobs to the area as a result. The 2,000 sq m building will play a crucial role in the country's fight against cyber-crime and offer more than 1,000 sq m of research and development floorspace in three cyber laboratories, business space for 16 companies and form an integral element of the University's Cyber Research Institute. The new centre is set to open in 2020.

Work has also started on the remodelling of the Sister Dora building at Walsall Campus. The work will see new state-of-the-art medical lab facilities created with new simulation labs and teaching rooms for a range of settings and disciplines.




#### **Football Hero**

The Sports Scholar also recently played at the Home Nations Tournament in Cardiff as part of the




### Space Software
