

Good Neighbours : Biwater

- 9 hectares open cast
- 250,000 tonnes of crushed material M1 widening works
- 3 million tonnes overburden excavated
- 95,000 tonnes coal extracted
- Engineered restoration
- Close proximity to housing tight environmental monitoring regime
- No noise complaints
- No dust complaints





Rationale for the Scheme


- Poor Agricultural Land
- Energy & Need for Coal
 - · Government fossil fuels, including coal, will continue to play an important role in the UK's energy mix;
 - · Strong national need for indigenous coal supplies
 - Benefits flexibility & security of supply;
- Economics
 - · A positive effect on the local & regional economy;
 - · Supporting economic growth
 - · Local employment, business rates to NEDDC, local expenditure, etc.
















Outline Figures

- Circa 30 hectares in size
- 170,000 tonnes of coal
- 5 million cum overburden
- 3 year duration earth works & coaling
- Series of cuts transitional for 6 months progressively worked and restored minimising impact
- Mitigation measures (noise bunds, dust control, visual screen)
- 1 year final restoration programme

 - · Preliminary assessment work noise;
 - Dust manageable, good record
