Information request

Thank you for your email of 26 June 2019. You requested the following information:

'...how much money has been spent to allow Network Rail to be able to close Pitmedden Level Crossing (Pitmedden Road) as part of their works in Dyce.

If possible please break this down to:

- Land Purchase Costs
- Property Purchase Costs
- Network Rail administration Costs
- Legal Costs (External)

We are considering your request under the Environmental Information Regulations 2004 (EIR). This piece of legislation, like the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA) in the UK, allows people to access information held by public authorities¹. I have dealt with your request under the EIR because it refers to measures likely to affect the environment².

Section 7(1) of the EIRs

Under regulation 7(1) of the EIRs a public authority may 'extend the period of 20 working days ... to 40 working days if it reasonably believes that the complexity and

volume of the information requested means that it is impracticable either to comply with the request within the earlier period or to make a decision to refuse to do so.' The Information Commissioner's guidance makes it clear that a public authority should apply this section of the EIRs when 'it reasonably believes it will require additional time to locate and provide the information because the requester has asked for a large amount of complex information and it would not be practical to provide the information or make a decision about whether to refuse the request within 20 working days.'

In this instance owing to the complexity of the questions you have raised and the need to consider the application of possible exceptions, it is necessary to extend the time in line with the provisions of regulation 7(1). Accordingly, I will now aim to respond to you by 22 August 2019 or sooner if possible.
