## FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 2000 - REQUEST REF: 0571-17

Thank you for your email of 16 June 2017 asking for information under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 2000. You asked:

- What are the rules and protocols for diplomatic bags? Please could you send them?
- Are there any rules on a diplomatic bags eg size ?
- Are there any circumstances when they may be seized or searched?
- Do the rules differ between countries or are the rules international?
- How do two countries agree on who is allowed to be Diplomats and aolowed diplomatic passports? What different treatment does someone get on a diplomatic passport?

Under section 21 of the Act, we are not required to provide information in response to a request if it is already reasonably accessible. Information relevant to your request about diplomatic bags can be found in the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations 1961 in Article 27 on the website via the following link:
