- There is a public interest in favour of ensuring that a public authority does not have to expend resources on justifying information in early draft or preliminary documents.
- The documents requested will be available to the public in the New Year when the AP2 mapbook is published.

## **Conclusion:**

The decision to withhold the information is upheld in the light of the arguments against disclosure. In this case, there are strong public interest considerations in not providing the requested data.
