I've spoken to the authors of the paper from 2012 (who also authored the forthcoming paper). The figure of 6,000 deaths could be an estimation of the excess (not necessarily avoidable) deaths for patients admitted on a Sunday (if we include Saturday it's more like 10,000) from the 2009/10 analysis of hospital admissions (Freemantle, 2012). It's calculated by applying the elevated risk (16%), to the actual number of deaths of patients admitted on a Sunday, within 30 days of admission.

Feel free to quote the original study from 2012.

The new article will say there are 10,000 deaths per year associated with the elevated mortality risk on a Friday (2%), Saturday (10%), Sunday(15%) and Monday(5%) — as compared with a Wednesday. The estimate of 6,000 could be the combined figure for just Saturday and Sunday. Very importantly though, the extent to which those 10k deaths are avoidable is not known.

The unpublished article is currently with one of the Journal's editors and, because of annual leave, we are unlikely to see its publication over the summer. Furthermore the Journal is likely to resist being pushed on this. However, I'm not sure the paper sets out the number of excess deaths associated with hospital admissions on a weekend anyway. What it will do is set out the elevated risk of mortality associated with weekend admission. Deloitte extrapolated the number of excess deaths from this risk in a similar study based on 2009/10 HES data (Freemantle et al, 2012) when we commissioned them to do an impact analysis of 7DS and actually calculated it to be 6,700.

There are no plans for further comms in the interim although we are expecting to send a letter next week to acute trusts through the Tripartite TDA and Monitor asking them to submit data on 7DS implementation progress at the beginning of September. This is so we have a baseline showing coverage of the 7DS clinical standards across England by the Autumn, but it doesn't cover mortality statistics.

In my role as Head of Profession for Statistics in the Department of Health I've been approached by the United Kingdom Statistics Authority as they are following up some queries they have received in relation to the "6,000 excess deaths" figure used by the SofS in a recent speech. We have explained some of the background to the use of the figure and I am likely to be written to formally in the next couple of days (just as I go on annual leave). I've reproduced the likely text below. I am keen to avoid undue criticism of either DH or of NHS England so I'm writing to ask if you can help with the bit which asks "how best to supplement the information currently available so that users can understand the source of the estimate".

Do you have a date for when the new research is formally published? Are there any plans for further communications in the interim? Is there anything else of which we need to be aware?

"I note the recent use by the Secretary of State for Health of an unpublished estimate of excess deaths arising through weekend admission to hospitals in England. This was reported widely in the media, and has been the subject of correspondence with the Authority.

As you and I discussed, we welcome the approach taken by the Department to releasing ad hoc data and analysis where it is used publicly by Ministers. Your approach ensures that statistics and other data mentioned publicly by Ministers and others are available equally to all users. You explained in this case that the estimate concerned comes from medical research, which you expect to be published by the researchers in the British Medical Journal in due course. Given your general approach, however, I would like to invite you to consider how best to supplement the information currently available so that users can understand the source of this estimate and how it differs from previous estimates. I would welcome an update from you once you have reached your conclusions, including any lessons learned for the general approach taken by the Department. In the meantime, if you would value any support either from me or from the Authority more widely, please do let me know. "

I am sorry to come in late on this, as I am on annual leave at the moment and Nick has kindly shared with me your proposed pressed statement on week end hospital mortality data for 2013/14 which reads as:

"the 6,000 figure is an estimate of additional deaths in hospital, based on an analysis of 2013/14 HES data that is due to be published in the BMJ shortly." Unfortunately this is not accurate. Our work does not refer to 6000 deaths as a result of increased mortality risk associated with week end hospital admission.

Our analysis has been submitted to a peer reviewed journal which has not decided on publication or not at this stage. It will be inaccurate and counterproductive to quote that our analysis is due to be published in the BMJ shortly, as this is not the case and may seem to interfere with the peer review process.

I would be grateful if you could consider amending your statement accordingly please.
