- 1. What can we learn from scribal self-correction? Give specific examples.
- 2. How do glosses aid our understanding of medieval manuscripts and texts?
- 3. How do scribes collaborate? Give a range of examples from different texts and manuscripts.
- 4. 'Visual cues for reading developed in part because of the need to read texts (particularly liturgical texts) aloud, and the development of punctuation was strongly influenced by oral recitation' (R. M. LIUZZA). Discuss with reference to a range of examples.
- 5. What are the advantages and disadvantages of electronic editions of medieval texts and manuscripts?
- 6. What principles might lie behind the selection of texts in medieval compilations?
- 7. 'The interactions between non-verbal and verbal forms of communication, more in particular the relations between visual symbols other than writing and the recording of speech in writing, are important for the evaluation of both images and texts (M. MOSTERT). Discuss with reference to specific manuscripts or inscribed objects.
