Hello.

I was disappointed to hear about the removal of the Levenshulme Bee Network (LBN) from the 'Our Active Neighbourhood Project'. Intervention regarding reducing traffic and increasing the safety of pedestrians/cyclists in Levenshulme is still desperately needed.

I understand the critiques of LBN and the narrow reach of their consultation, but the sentiment in Levenshulme is still overwhelmingly pro-intervention, perhaps to an even greater extent than LBN were suggesting, expanding their vision to include larger roads such as Broom Lane, Cromwell Grove and Matthews Lane. I am concerned the problems people had with LBN are being misunderstood to mean those people are against any intervention in Levenshulme.

As the COVID crisis continues, we need to prepare for a future where public transport may be too hazardous for some, but people will still need to get to their jobs. This new transport could take two forms:

- *Walking and cycling:* Those who are physically able could switch from public transport to walking/cycling, and will require better pavements/cycle lane infrastructure to ensure their safety. They would also benefit from traffic calming to encourage more people to travel in this fashion. This may even include e-bikes and e-scooters in the future.

- *Driving: *Those too vulnerable for public transport and unable to walk/cycle will need to drive or get a taxi. This will be more manageable if people who don't require a car use alternate forms of transport such as walking/cycling. By only having those on the road who need to be there you make things more accessible for those who rely on driving.

	Dear , I hope you are well. Today I attended the protest in Levenshulme calling for safe cycling routes though the area and along the A6. It is sad that despite dangerous levels of air pollution, rising obesity and the current limited capacity of public transport that Manchester is resisting calls for cycle lanes. Safety is often cited as as a barrier to the wider adoption of cycling that is seen in other countries. High quality cycling infrastructure would help solve many of the problems we face. Additionally there is growing evidence that air pollution worsens the effects of Covid, possibly explaining why some of the poorest and most deprived communities have be worse hit. As we return to work, minimising avoidable car use has never been so important. While Manchester has provided a few great flagship projects like Oxford Road and the new CYCLOPS junction in Hulme, most of the city and suburbs are left behind. Combined with the pause of the Levy Bee Lines project, delay of the clean air zone and continued reduction in bus routes it seems that Manchester commitment to active travel is only superficial. A week ago the Guardian reported that Conservative councils were blocking progress on cycling, but it seems that Manchester Labour Council are no better






