Walton Street (Oxford) Experimental Order - Prohibition Motor Vehicles

Recommendation

- 1. It is recommended:
 - To progress with the implementation and formal consultation of the experimental order

Proposal Summary

 An experimental traffic regulation order prohibiting motor vehicle access to Walton Street from Worcester/Beaumont Street, Oxford as shown on the plan at Annex 1.

Statement of Reason

- 3. The reason for this action is the creation of a "Low Traffic Neighbourhood" which would bring the following benefits:
 - Improving air quality in the direct area,
 - Reducing traffic congestion in the local area by removing the signalised junction of Walton Street/Worcester Street,
 - Helping to create a safer environment for cyclists and pedestrians within the city, and
 - Reducing "rat running".

Potential impacts & risks

- 4. Potential for Increased traffic on adjacent residential roads as traffic seeks an alternative route.
- 5. Potential for an increase in the number of vehicles attempting to make a u-turns on arrival at the restriction, which could potentially lead to safety concerns.
- 6. Impact on the ability of emergency services to reach call-outs.

Preliminary Consultation

- 7. In line with requirements, a preliminary consultation was undertaken for the minimum period of 3 weeks with key/statutory stakeholders & a period of 2 weeks for local residents to check if any material concern or objection is raised. The letter sent out to residents is at Annex 2, and the list of key stakeholders consulted at Annex 3.
- 8. The council received 493 individual* (see point 9 below) responses in total which, and in summary;
 - 310 (63%) in support,
 - 160 (32%) objections, and
 - 23 non-objections or raising concerns (5%).
- A petition was also received, signed by 65 residents of Walton Street (who may have also contributed separately to the consultation) registering their support for the decision to close Walton Street to through traffic, shown in the additional document; <u>Annex 5</u>



Re: Experimental Low Traffic Neighbourhood, Walton Street (Oxford)

We are writing to seek your initial views on a proposed experimental Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO) to restrict access to Walton Street from Worcester/Beaumont Street, Oxford (see attached plan).

To assist the authority in deciding whether or not to undertake the experimental closure, we are carrying out a short two week 'yes' or 'no' consultation supplemented with any short comments to explain why. The consultation will close on **18**th **October 2019**.

If a decision is made to proceed with the trial, then this would commence in November and be in place for up to 18 months. The first 6 months would then form part of a formal consultation period.

The trial closure will be closely monitored and any comments/complaints that are received will be given due consideration with a view to deciding whether any amendments are required to what has been put in place and if the experiment should become permanent.

Access by motor vehicles to and from all premises in the Jericho and Walton Manor areas to the north of Beaumont Street and west of Woodstock Road would be via the side roads on the west side of Woodstock Road. As part of the process, the pedestrian crossing on Worcester Street will be reinstated. Parking for residents will be permitted in line with the existing pre closure arrangements.

The county council sees this trial as having the key benefits of:

- Improving air quality in the direct area
- Reducing traffic congestion in the local area by removing the signalised junction of Walton Street/Worcester Street

- Helping to create a safer environment for cyclists and pedestrians within the city
- Reducing "rat running"

The two-week consultation process will run from Friday 4 October 2019 to 1600 on Friday 18 October 2019. If there are no significant objections and the Cabinet Member for Environment agrees to proceed with the process, the county council will seek to register the ETRO and the Experimental Order will come into force on 1 November 2019.
