FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 2000 YOUR REQUEST FOR INFORMATION

I confirm that your request for information has been considered.

The Authority does hold this information, please find the details below.

Request:

In the Minutes of the East Area committee of Sunderland City Council on 5/10/2015, your representative, Jeff Boath presented the update from Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service. He is quoted as saying that "deliberate fires were still an issue with there being a 50 percent increase in deliberate fires; these were mainly rubbish fires."

In the End of Quarter 2 (April – September) Performance Report 2015/16, quoted in the minutes of the TWFRA Policy and Performance committee meeting of 9/11/2015, "loose refuse" is referred to as a contributory cause in the 14.1% increase in deliberate secondary fires in the area.

1. What is your definition of loose refuse?

Response:

There isn't any guidance from Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) with regards to the definition of loose refuse. However, it is interpreted as any refuse which is not contained in a container.

Please give statistics for the number of rubbish fires quarterly in Sunderland for the last 5 years.

Response:

Rubbish fires include fires which are identified in our Incident Recording System (IRS) as having a motive of deliberate with a property type of either:

- Large refuse / rubbish container (e.g. skip)
- Loose refuse (including in a garden)
- Wheelie Bins
- Small refuse / rubbish / recycle container (excluding wheelie bins)
- Refuse / rubbish tip

4. Has there been an increase in fires associated with bulky rubbish items such as mattresses and furniture, over this period in Sunderland? (If you haven't statistics for this, your expert opinion will be satisfactory).

Response:

'Large refuse / rubbish container (e.g. skip)' is the closest category we have in the IRS that can match with fires associated with bulky items. Please see the information below:

Request:

5. What is the policy of the Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue service in regard to fly tipping and waste materials; do you notify the council to arrange for removal, when material is not on private land and an arson potential? Is this a big problem for you?

Response:

Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service reports fly tipping incidences to the local authorities to arrange for removal. To identify if fly tipping is a problem in any area, you will need to contact the relevant local authority.

I hope this is satisfactory. If this fails to resolve your concerns then you have the right to apply to the Information Commissioner for a decision.
