Dear Ruth Bartlett,

Thank you for your Freedom of Information (FoI) requests received on 20 April, You wrote:

"I would like to receive all medical protocols used by DWP and IAS when assessing PIP claimants with the following conditions:

ADHD Autism OCD Dyspraxia

I would also like to receive any relevant training materials used by DWP and IAS in relation to the above conditions."

DWP Response

We confirm that we hold the information you have requested, but some of this information is commercially sensitive and is therefore exempt from release under Section 43 of the Fol Act. Section 43(2) exempts information which, if disclosed would be likely to prejudice the commercial interests of our assessment providers, and the department's future dealings with them or other service providers.

We are unable to provide copies of medical protocols and detailed training material because if publicly released, the material contained and the general guidance that is provided to trainers, if seen by candidates, may lead to unfair advantage and inappropriate successful completion of the course. To release the information would render it useless for the purpose that it is intended. It would also result in the training material having to be rewritten on a regular basis which would have a commercial impact upon both the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) and Independent Assessment Services (IAS).

In applying this exemption, DWP has balanced the public interest in withholding the information against the public interest in disclosing the information and consider there is no overarching public interest argument in favour of releasing this information as DWP is unable to prejudice its commercial interests.

As required by the FoI Act, the use of Section 43(2) requires the public interest for and against disclosure to be assessed. There is a public interest in the disclosure of commercial information to ensure transparency in the accountability of public funds, and to show that public money is being used effectively. Conversely, there is a public interest in ensuring that disclosure does not compromise an existing competitive market environment, or the department's ability to secure best value for money for the taxpayer. On balance I am satisfied that, in this instance, the public interest in applying the exemption outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

However, we can supply you with a set of Condition Insight Reports (CIR) produced by IAS. These are issued to all their health professionals (HPs) and updated regularly. They are written by charities and representative groups to give HPs insight into the lived experience of disabled people. IAS is not able to provide a CIR for every possible condition or diagnosis.

Please see the attached CIR which has sections for Autism and OCD. IAS do not hold a CIR for Dyspraxia or ADHD.
