YOUR REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION

With reference to your requests of 26th May 2012, I am writing to inform you that these requests are refused under Section 14 (1) of the Freedom of Information Act.

Section 14 (1) states that a public authority is not obliged to comply with a request if the request is vexatious.

In reaching our decision we have considered the recent review of the Conemaster economic benefits, a considerable piece of publicly funded work commissioned by the Highways Agency, in response to your approach to the Minister.

In addition you have submitted two Parliamentary Questions plus a total of six Freedom of Information requests to the Highways Agency related to the subject of the Conemaster machine and road closures for highway maintenance. In addition we understand that you have also contacted the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS) and the Department for Transport, our parent Department, on the same subject. We have tried, wherever possible, to answer all of your previous requests.

Your recent requests continue the same pattern of requests which are related to the subject of Conemaster. Despite providing you with the information you have requested, there is no indication that these requests will cease; and providing more information will likely lead to further correspondence and requests that are unlikely to satisfy your interest.

Whilst we were considering your requests of the 24th April and the 10th May you submitted these further requests. These overlapping requests are having the effect of Page 1 of 3





harassing the teams handling them and is incurring a significant diversion of resources from core Highways Agency duties.
