A6 Project description

Briefly describe the project, telling us what the project will achieve and what our grant will pay for.

Billinghay is the most deprived community in the North Kesteven District and has seen its secondary school close and be demolished. Billinghay is a rural settlement in the region of 2500 residents sited on the edge of the Fens in Lincolnshire, nine miles from the market town of Sleaford and 17 miles from the City of Lincoln. The LSOA of Billinghay is estimated to have 506 young people aged up to 15 years, this makes up 20.2% of the total population. This proportion is higher than that of North Kesteven as a whole (17.8%) and England (18.7%). (Source: ONS 2010 Population Estimates LSOA Level (Experimental)).

The I.play system has been designed by British firm, Playdale Playgrounds Ltd to encourage children away from the sofa and into the playground. It aims to break new ground in playground equipment through the invention of a facility that will promote high energy exercise for the young. By offering team game options, the i.play system raises and maintains motivation in children lacking in exercise confidence. The I.play system is fully solar powered, contributing to the creation of environmentally sustainable playgrounds and facilities.

By creating a device that is highly interactive, challenging and fun, it invites children and young people to start exercising – and stay exercising. Children can enter their scores in the 'my I.play' section of the I Play website, and view the scores of others on the i.play system league table. Teachers can also use the website as a classroom tool to encourage children to identify their exercise levels and spark discussion and learning on the impact of exercise and diet on health and fitness. The grant will cover the supply of the equipment, provision of a safety surface, base preparation and installation.

A7 Project beneficiaries

Tell us about the people and organisations that will mostly benefit from the project and, in particular, how many people will benefit directly from the project.

The Place Survey 2008 asked residents what they thought needed improving in their local area. Activities for teenagers (40%), sports and leisure facilities (18%) and facilities for young children (17%) all ranked highly with the residents of Billinghay. The need for activities and entertainment for young people is further backed up by Police data that shows that between March 2011 and February 2012, 111 crimes took place in Billinghay, of which 55 were Anti-Social Behaviour related. This equates to one antisocial behaviour crime for every 46 people for the year.

Consultation carried out by the Billinghay In-Zone (The BIZ) which is a newly formed youth group identified that many young people believe that there is nothing in the village for them. Travelling around the village in the evenings you will find the young people at various points in the village, but rarely at the playing fields, which has nothing to offer the young people, and is in the wrong place for them. There is a need to occupy these young people with something that is enjoyable and constructive.

The Youth Group were consulted and were unanimously supportive of this type of equipment as opposed to traditional play equipment. Their average attendance is 25 and the highest recorded number was 33. These are 13-19 year olds. Consultations took place with the Billinghay Church of England School Council which provided excellent feedback as the benefits to be gained and considered its optimum location identified the need to locate the equipment near to the new Childrens Centre. What is also excellent is that the members of the School Council presented the proposal to the whole School or 158 students to get their views. The age of these young people are 3-11 years old

A8 Fit with strategy

Billinghay is a rural settlement in the region of 2500 residents sited on the edge of the Fens in Lincolnshire, nine miles from the market town of Sleaford and 17 miles from the City of Lincoln. There is a primary school and a new children's centre within the village but the secondary school was closed in 2010. There are 506 children in the village aged 15 years and younger which makes up 20% of the overall population. The two Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) that Billinghay falls within are ranked at 11350 out of 32482 areas in England (where rank one is the most deprived). It, and the neighbouring area to the South of Billinghay, are the only areas outside of Sleaford that are among the most deprived 40% of LSOAs in England. Compared areas in the Country, Billinghay isn't ranked that highly in terms of overall deprivation. However, its income and employment deprivation and rurality means that the wider area is amongst the 3% most deprived areas in England for barriers to housing and services. (Source: Index of Multiple Deprivation 2010)

The LSOA of Billinghay is estimated to have 506 young people aged up to 15 years, this makes up 20.2% of the total population. This proportion is higher than that of North Kesteven as a whole (17.8%) and England (18.7%). (Source: ONS 2010 Population Estimates LSOA Level (Experimental)). Billinghay is a priority area in respect of the Childrens Play Strategy.

The closure of the Laffrd High School in 2010 has had a direct impact on Anti Social Behaviour and Crime. The need for activities and entertainment for young people is further backed up by Police data that shows that between March 2011 and February 2012, 111 crimes took place in Billinghay, of which 55 were Anti-Social Behaviour related. This equates to one antisocial behaviour crime for every 46 people for the year. By reducing levels of ASB there will ber a direct correlation between Community Cohensive and a sense of not being in fear of crime.
