Module Guide for the academic year 2019-20

PPL Programme

The LLB Politics, Philosophy and Law programme offers a unique opportunity for students to fulfil the requirements of a qualifying law degree. It's a four-year single honours degree programme worth 480 credits. In each year you take 120 credits worth of full modules (30 credits) or half modules (15 credits) from the School of Law, Department of Philosophy and the Department of Political Economy. These modules are a combination of core and optional modules.

Each module has a 'level' and a number of credits.

- Year 2 Level 4 & 6 (Law) modules; and Level 5 (Philosophy and Political Economy modules)
 You must study two core modules, Criminal Law (30 credits) and Government and Law (30 credits), plus a further 30 credits of optional modules from Philosophy and 30 credits from Politics.
- Years 3 and 4 Level 5 and/or 6 modules

In years 3 and 4 you must take 4 core modules 6FFLK001 Law of Tort, 6FFLK002 Law of Property, 6FFLK003 Law of Trusts and 6FFLK906 Jurisprudence and Legal Theory which can be taken across both years.

You have a free choice of optional modules to the value of 120 credits from Law, Politics or Philosophy and can be a combination of full modules (30 credits) and half modules (15 credits).

- Some modules are taught in semester 1 and some in semester 2.
- ➤ Students in years 3 and 4 can take an intercollegiate Law module. Please consult the UG Law Module Selection 19-20 KEATS page for information on this later next week.
- ➤ PPL students are eligible to take an additional 15 or 30 credits so that their total number of credits taken across the degree is 495-510. If you would like to take an additional number of credits, please select these as part of the normal online module selection process when it opens or email ug-law@kcl.ac.uk. This is an option for years 3 and 4 only.
 - N.B. There is no requirement to take extra modules it is at students' discretion however we encourage you to give it sufficient thought as there is already a high workload and with extracurricular pursuits and of course a social life and time for relaxation, it can become a lot to manage.
