We are unable to supply the following information:

- Average, median and quartile information for GMAT score by College, because we believe that individuals could be identified as a result. In presenting the information in this way, the University is engaging the exemption at section $40(3 A)(a)$ of the Act because release in the precise format requested would breach the first data protection principle (the fair, lawful and transparent processing of personal data) as set out in the General Data Protection Regulation. This part of section 40 confers absolute exemption under the Act.
- Average GPA of those admitted - we cannot calculate this as we have so many forms of degree score - percentage, letter grading, scale of 4.0/5.0/7.0, first/second class, etc. There is no way for us to convert all degree scores into one form of score and therefore cannot calculate an average.
- Admission criteria marking scheme for admission - we do not have a marking scheme for admission.
- Weighting allocated to GMAT, GPA, essay and reference letters - we do not give particular weight to a certain aspect of a profile.

With regard to the last two questions, we take a holistic approach to reviewing each individual application and we do not use a scientific approach to review.
