Thank you for your request for information, which was received on 30th May 2015. You have requested information on the names of all the chief executives (or equivalent) within multi-academy trusts including email details and postal address.

I have dealt with your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

The Education Funding Agency (EFA) is responsible for funding and monitoring academies, university technical colleges, studio schools, and free schools. The EFA does not collect details of chief executives from multi-academy trusts. However, it does collect and maintain information on the accounting officer of each trust and we have answered this request by providing these details. In line with the Academies Financial Handbook, the accounting officer of a multi-academy trust should be either its chief executive or executive principal. Please see the description below of the accounting officer role from the Academies Financial handbook:

## 1.5.19 Responsibilities of the academy trust's accounting officer

1.5.20 Each academy trust must designate a named individual as its accounting officer. The individual must be a fit and suitable person for the role. In trusts comprising a single academy this should be the principal. In multi-academy trusts it should be the chief executive or executive principal.

The EFA holds the following information about accounting officers that falls within scope of your request: full name; email address; and postal address. The other contact information you requested is not held by the EFA and therefore cannot be provided. Companies House holds further information for trusts, so you may wish to visit their page on the GOV.UK.

I have enclosed the data you requested with a small number of email addresses removed, where we hold 3<sup>rd</sup> party personal data and so have applied section 40(2) (personal data). Personal data is that which relates to a living individual who can be identified from that data, or from that data and other information which is likely to be in, or to come into, the

possession of the requestor. Disclosure of this information would contravene a number of the data protection principles in the Data Protection Act 1998, and would be regarded as 'unfair'. By that, we mean the likely expectations of the data subject that his or her information would not be disclosed to others and the effect which disclosure would have on the data subject. Section 40(2) is an absolute exemption and is not subject to the public interest test.

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If you have any queries about this letter, please contact me. Please remember to quote the reference number above in any future communications.

If you are unhappy with the way your request has been handled, you should make a complaint to the Department by writing to me within two calendar months of the date of this letter. Your complaint will be considered by an independent review panel, who were not involved in the original consideration of your request. If you are not content with the outcome of your complaint to the Department, you may then contact the Information Commissioner's Office.
