Dear Joseph Lloyd

I refer to your request where you asked:

“to see full copies of the following materials produced by National Economy Recovery Taskforce dated January through March 2021:

- *Reports*
- *Memos*
- *Presentations*
- *Briefing notes*
- *Minutes, agendas and actions logs of meetings”*

I am writing to advise you that following a search of our paper and electronic records, I have established that some of the information you requested is held by the Cabinet Office.

Information you have requested is exempt under section 35(1)(a) and (b) of the Freedom of Information Act, which protects the formulation of policy and communications between Ministers. This includes information about the discussions that have taken place at Cabinet and its Committees, how often they have met, and attendees. Disclosure would weaken Ministers’ ability to discuss controversial and sensitive topics free from premature public scrutiny.

Section 35 is a qualified exemption and I have considered whether the balance of the public interest favours our release of this material. There is a general public interest in disclosure of information and I recognise that openness in government may increase public trust in and engagement with the government. I recognise that the decisions Ministers make may have a significant impact on the lives of citizens and there is a public interest in their deliberations being transparent. These public interests have to be weighed against a strong public interest that policy-making and its implementation are of the highest quality and informed by a full consideration of all the options. Ministers must be able to discuss policy freely and frankly, exchange views on available options and understand their possible implications in Cabinet and its Committees. The candour of all involved would be affected by their assessment of whether the topics, content and frequency of the discussions in Committee meetings will be disclosed prematurely. If these items were routinely made public there is a risk that Ministers may feel inhibited from being frank and candid with one another. As a result the quality of debate underlying collective decision making would decline, leading to worse informed and poorer decision making. Taking into account all the circumstances of this case, I have concluded that the balance of the public interest favours withholding this information.
