Important Information about your visit:

- Your doctor has referred you for a specialist opinion because of your abnormal and heavy periods (menorraghia).
- You do not have to cancel your appointment if you are having a period, unless the bleeding is very heavy.
- You are welcome to bring someone with you.
- We recommend you take 1g of paracetamol one hour prior to your appointment.
- Please bring a panty liner/sanitary towel with you.

Please bring a URINE SAMPLE for pregnancy testing prior to the procedure.

What will happen at the clinic?

- The specialist will take a brief history of your symptoms. Please keep a record of your last menstrual period, your last cervical smear and any current medication.
- Your consent will be obtained for any procedures required at this appointment.
- If appropriate, a hysteroscopy will be performed to find out any reason why you are having heavy periods.
- After the hysteroscopy we will discuss our findings with you and a plan made for you.

What is a hysteroscopy?

- A hysteroscopy is a technique which allows the specialist to look directly into the womb.
- A thin telescope called a hysteroscope is passed very gently through the cervix (neck of the womb) into the womb itself.
- The specialist will see a clear view of your uterus (comb) via a television screen, which will help with a diagnosis.
- A local anaesthetic may be used to numb the area if required.
- A small sample may be taken from the uterus (womb) lining: this is a little uncomfortable (like a period cramp) but is usually well tolerated.
- The sample is sent to the laboratory for examination.
- You will be informed of the results either by our GP or at your next clinic visit.

After the examination:

- You may have some spotting or bleeding which may last one to three days.
- You may have some period like pain this will soon resolve or you may need to take a painkiller e.g. paracetamol or ibuprofen.
- Alternative treatments for your heavy periods will be fully discussed with you at your appointment and any
 questions that you may have will be answered.
