Oxfordshire Play Strategy & Action Plan 2011-2014







Play is Important

Article 31 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) recognises:

"The right of the child to rest and leisure, to engage in PLAY and recreational activities appropriate to the age of the child and to participate freely in cultural life and the arts." (UNCRC, 1989)

Play is a vital ingredient of life for children and young people of all ages. Opportunities to play are necessary for them to function fully as healthy human beings, and to develop their physical, social, emotional, language, creative and intellectual abilities. Modern life has introduced obstacles to play, such as traffic, TV, computers and fewer open spaces.

This Play Strategy aims to overcome these obstacles to play in Oxfordshire, and to highlight the importance of play in increasing children and young people's physical and mental health and wellbeing, as well as their sense of feeling valued within their communities. Play also supports efforts to reduce bullying, anti-social behaviour, obesity, childhood depression, physical ill-health and has been shown to improve mental health through the stages of prevention, early intervention and to support recovery for children in need and survivors of abuse.

The Strategy has been created by the Oxfordshire Play Partnership, which includes representation from all local authorities in the county and voluntary and community sector (VCS) organisations. Each member of the partnership will have its own action plan reflecting their area of specialism or geography. This strategy focuses on activity which has a countywide significance, and includes children and young people age 0-19 years, and up to 25 years for disabled young people and care leavers.

Aims of the Oxfordshire Play Strategy:

<u>Mission</u>: To increase the number and quality of play opportunities available to children and young people of all ages.

This includes in natural areas, playgrounds, schools, out-of-school activities, childcare, children's centres, in families and homes, intergenerational play, in public spaces, in neighbourhoods and communities, rural and urban areas, hospitals, prisons, young offenders' institutions, leisure centres, residential care homes, detention centres.

- 1. Enable wider participation and access to play opportunities, so that everyone regardless of background, disability and age can be included.
- 2. Provide opportunities for children to manage risk in their play.
- 3. Involve children and young people in the planning and provision of play opportunities and the development of play policy.
- 4. Increase awareness of the value and benefits of play through information and publicity.
- 5. Encourage everyone to be creative and innovative in developing play opportunities.
- 6. Increase the number of people trained and qualified in play.
- 7. Encourage more partnership working to support the development of play in Oxfordshire.
- 8. Ensure that infrastructure and support is available to achieve the mission of this strategy.



History

The first Oxfordshire Play Strategy was launched in May 2007. This is an extension of that strategy to 2014. This strategy should be read in conjunction with the Oxfordshire Play Policy, which outlines the need for children and young people to have exciting as well as safe play areas, and promote the idea of risk-benefit assessments to replace the traditional risk assessments.

Roles & responsibilities for Oxfordshire Play Partnership and the Local Area Play Partnerships

Oxfordshire Play Partnership

A countywide strategic partnership for policy makers.

- Take a strategic overview of play in Oxfordshire
- Represent Oxfordshire at national events
- Provide a forum for discussing best practice / information and disseminating to local area partnerships and partners
- Advocate for play at the strategic level
- Develop and implement the Oxfordshire Play Strategy, Action Plan and Play Policy
- Respond to strategic funding opportunities for play opportunities within Oxfordshire

Local Area Play Partnerships

For play providers, statutory and voluntary agencies and anyone who has an interest in children's play locally. Areas are based on 4 districts in Oxfordshire (Vale & South, Oxford City, Cherwell and West)

- Increase the number and quality of play opportunities for children and young people aged 0-19 years locally
- Bring together play providers and other representatives to share resources and information to meet the play needs of children and young people
- Disseminate good practice
- Offer a forum to network and develop joint-working arrangements
- Meet the Oxfordshire Play Strategy objectives at a local level.
- Develop and implement a local play strategy and action plan.
