Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Request - 181219015

Thank you for your request dated 19 December 2018 in which you asked for the following information from the Ministry of Justice (MoJ):

Please release 1 year proven reoffending rates of men sentenced to less than 12 months; less than 6 months and less than 3 months.

Your request is being handled under the FOIA.

I can confirm that the MoJ holds the information that you have requested and I have provided it in the attached table.

The table shows the proven one year reoffending rate for male adult offenders given a custodial sentence, by the requested sentence lengths, for the three-monthly cohorts over the last year (up to October to December 2016 – latest currently available) in England and Wales.

A proven reoffence is defined as any offence committed in a one-year follow-up period that resulted in a court conviction, or caution in the one-year follow-up or a further six month waiting period, to allow time for cases to progress through the courts.
