## **REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: 2022-683093**

Your request was received on 28 December 2022 and has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 (FOI(S)A).

Your request asks for information that spans sessions 5 and 6 of the Scottish Parliament. We therefore provide further information about the respective public audit committees in place during these two sessions of Parliament and the associated remit for each committee.

The Public Audit Committee was established for session five and first met on 16 June 2016. On 29 September 2016, the Committee changed its name to the Public Audit and Post-Legislative Scrutiny (PAPLS) Committee. The remit of the PAPLS Committee was to consider and report on the following (and any additional matter added under Standing Order Rule 6.1.5A):

- any accounts laid before the Parliament;
- any report laid before or made to the Parliament by the Auditor General for Scotland;
- any other document laid before the Parliament, or referred to it by the Parliamentary Bureau or by the Auditor General for Scotland, concerning financial control, accounting and auditing in relation to public expenditure; and
- post-legislative scrutiny.

The Public Audit Committee established for session six has met since June 2021. The remit of the Public Audit Committee is to consider and report on the following (and any additional matter added under Standing Order Rule 6.1.5A):

- any accounts laid before the Parliament;
- any report laid before or made to the Parliament by the Auditor General for Scotland; and
- any other document laid before the Parliament, or referred to it by the Parliamentary Bureau or by the Auditor General for Scotland, concerning financial control, accounting and auditing in relation to public expenditure.

Information regarding the total number of meetings held and the proportion of these meetings held in private is summarised in each committee's annual report. Links to these reports are provided below:

In common with other Parliamentary committees, the Public Audit Committee meets in private for a range of reasons. For example, when considering draft committee reports, it meets in private to facilitate the achievement of consensus and prevent media focus on preliminary conclusions which may not feature in the final report. Meeting in private also enables the Committee to consider its work programme and confidential or sensitive material (for example, evidence from vulnerable or intimidated people), which would not be appropriate to discuss during a public meeting. The decision to meet in private must be agreed by the Committee.
