Thanks for your email.

The gap that we ask local councils to leave after the Council's seal is simply so that the Department's confirmation slip can be attached below the seal. So you simply need to leave the appropriate gap after the Council's seal and we will attach the slip which will include the wording "Signed by the Secretary of State" and "Date of confirmation". You do not necessarily need to insert

this wording.

On your final point the normal statutory procedure is that if the byelaws are confirmed they will come into effect one month after the date of confirmation, and the confirmation letter will make this clear.

In very exceptional circumstances the Department can consider inserting an earlier date but we would need to have a strong justification for bringing the byelaws into force earlier, especially as the one month period between signed confirmation and byelaws coming into force is intended to give local councils the opportunity to display notices about the impending notices. The one month period also gives the local community sufficient time to become aware of these impending byelaws, including making any necessary changes in behaviour. Given the nature of the byelaws, and the need for the local community, including tourists and water craft owners who may not be familiar with the area, you will want to consider allowing for his one month period.


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

I wish to register my objection to the sites designated for mooring in the following areas: Plan 13-18 the 1 hour mooring here is not needed as there is mooring available by the Teddington lock and operated by the EA. The areas with the red lines for 1 hour mooring on the map region here are in the narrowest stretch of the river. This area is also where there are major canoe, skiff and other clubs using this narrow stretch of the river. No other similarly narrow area of the river has 1 hour mooring on these maps.

Plan 1-6 the 24 hour mooring by Garrick's Eyot will prevent boat club users gaining access here. Plan 7 The 24 hour mooring site by Broom Rec will prevent park users having a view of the river from the park benches here.
