Other sites are much large in size (Fenns &amp; Whixall and Minera). Consequently site has been listed as a candidate SSSI for its reptile assemblage. Adder has not been recorded on site though the species has been recorded in the environs of Rhydymwyn</li> <li>The site has been subject to annual reptile surveillance. Results suggest decline in status of grass snake.</li> <li>Assemblage is highly vulnerable to public access. In my view, any change in tenure or use must not result in increased public use of the site. Ideally public access should be reduced.</li> </ol>
