Sorry, realised I never followed this up earlier in terms of a line on Twitter bots. Claire is also now after a line on this for a meeting on Thursday so this might be a good place to start for that as well. The allegation is that a study found 13,000 automated Twitter accounts (bots) that tweeted messages in support of the leave campaigns and shared/retweeted eachother. The effect was to a) create a false sense of lots of people discussing and sharing these messages and b) it pushed up these messages on Twitter's trending list, meaning more real people were likely to see the messages. This feeds in to concerns raised about 'dark' things going on without scrutiny or regulation. I have a suggested (fairly long) line below as a starting point. I know Bob is leaning away from saying anything about whether we've received/not received evidence of things like this.

An Electoral Commission spokesperson said:

"The Commission is the regulator of political and campaign finance, and our regulatory remit is around the funding of and spending by parties, non-party campaigners and referendum campaigners. We do not regulate the contents of campaign adverts, but whether those placing the adverts have complied with the rules.

"Social media provides increased scale, speed and specificity of targeting compared with traditional campaigning methods, though the same rules still apply. Spending limits and rules on reporting spending and donations all apply to campaigners, parties and individuals if they engage in regulated campaigning around elections and referenda.

"Anyone who believes they have evidence suggesting impropriety in campaign funding should provide it to the Commission and the police immediately."

However, if we do think we should have a line on twitter bots it would be good to go ahead and agree one anyway.




