Conclusion: We believe that the cost of compliance with the request would be too great and that the request is manifestly unreasonable and that therefore Regulation 12(4)(b) of EIR can be considered.

Under ICO guidance we understand that we must consider whether it is reasonable in all circumstances to withhold this information before considering whether there is a public interest in disclosing it. To comply with the request would require staff time of over 21 hours or over 3 working days which would place a substantial and disproportionate burden on the resources of HS2 Ltd. It may also involve an additional cost if we have to an external consultant.

For these reasons we believe Regulation 12(4)(b) applies and the reasons against disclosure outweigh the public interest in providing the information.
